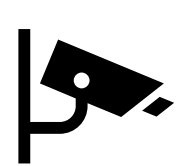

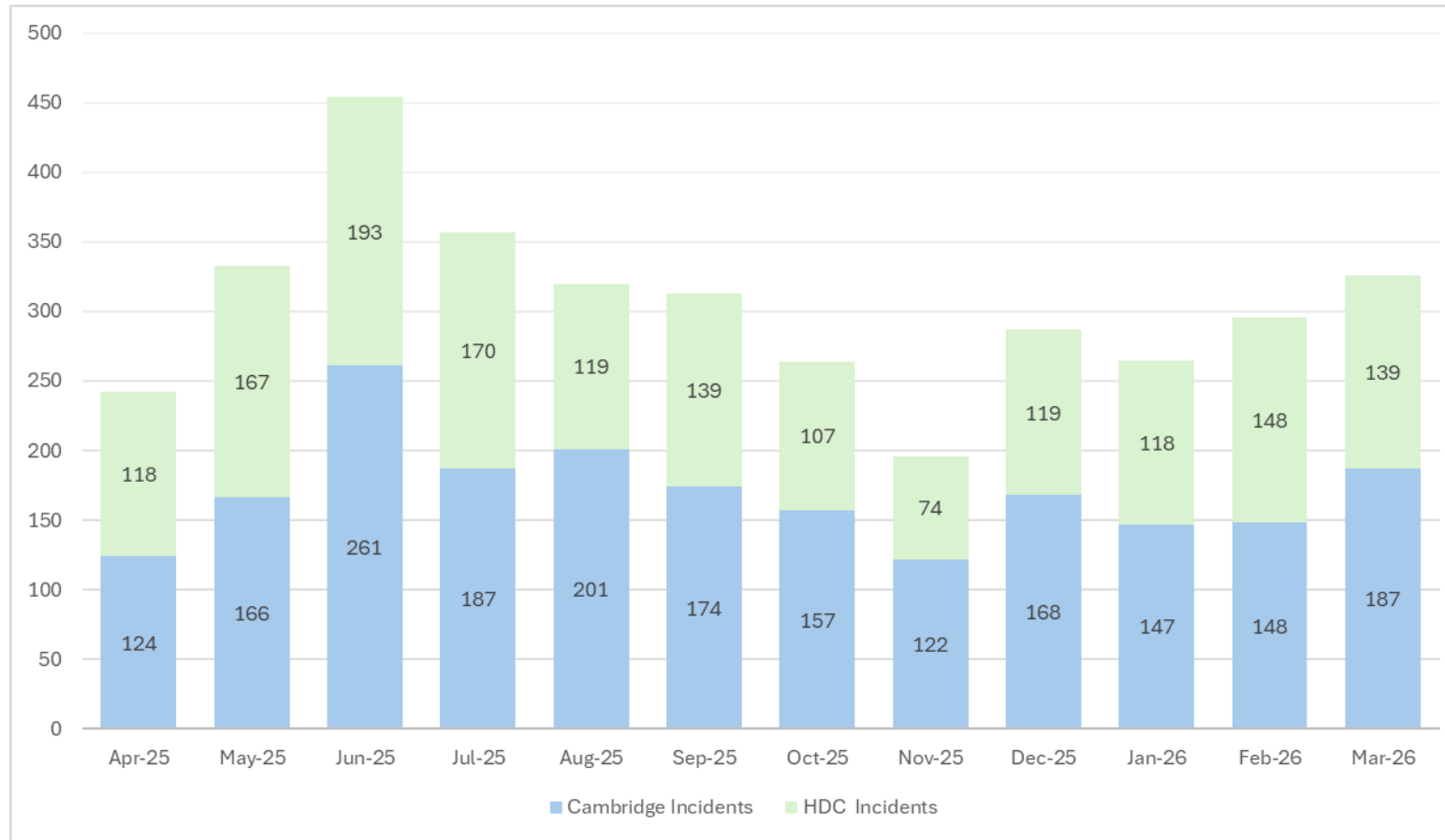

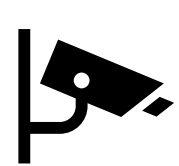


TOTAL CCTV INCIDENTS BY COUNCIL APRIL 2025 – MARCH 2026



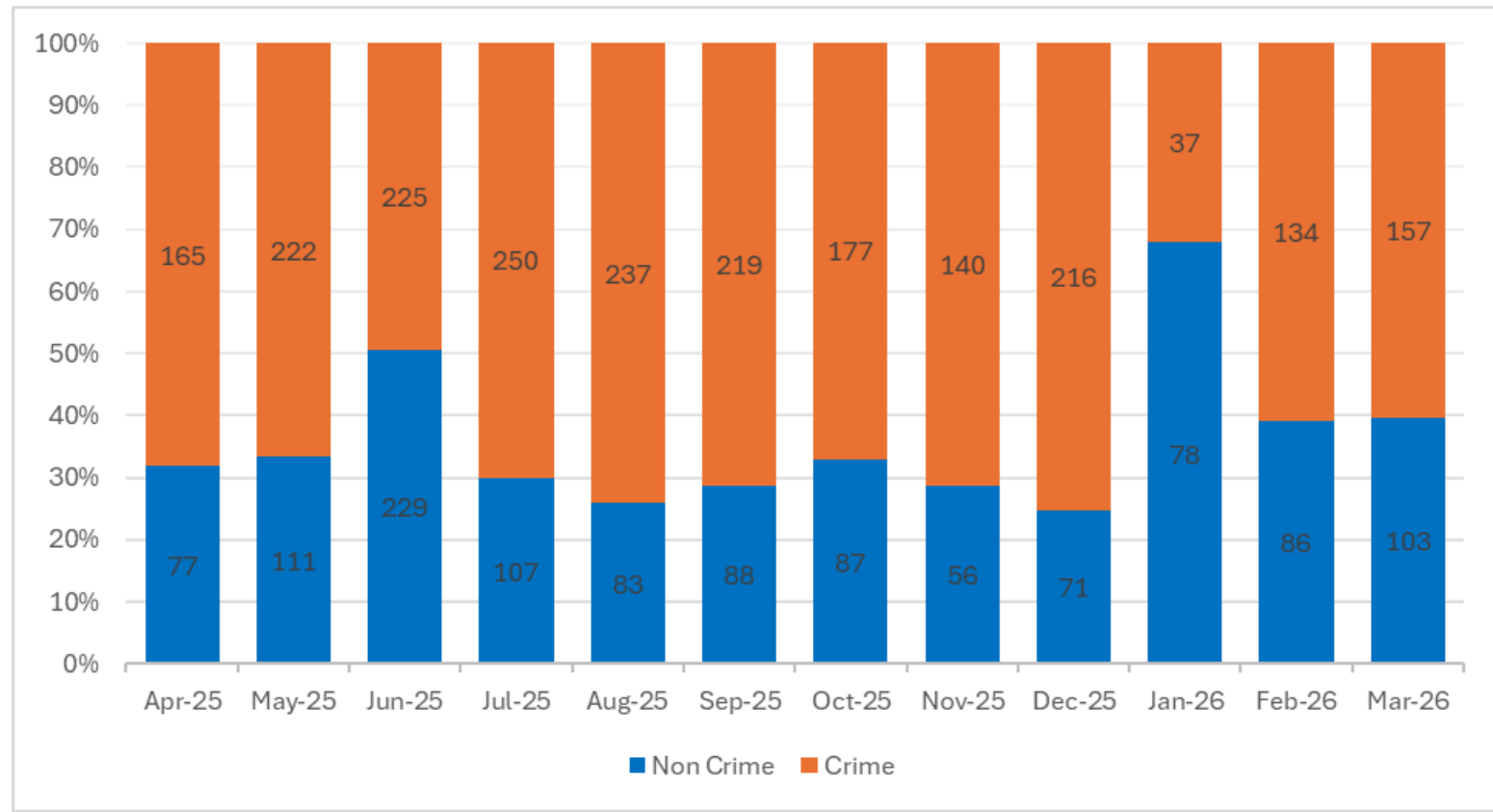

TOTAL CCTV INCIDENTS: CRIME VS NON-CRIME % SPLIT

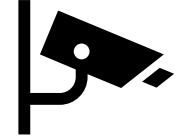

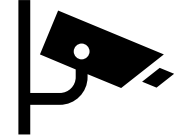

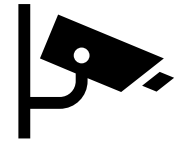

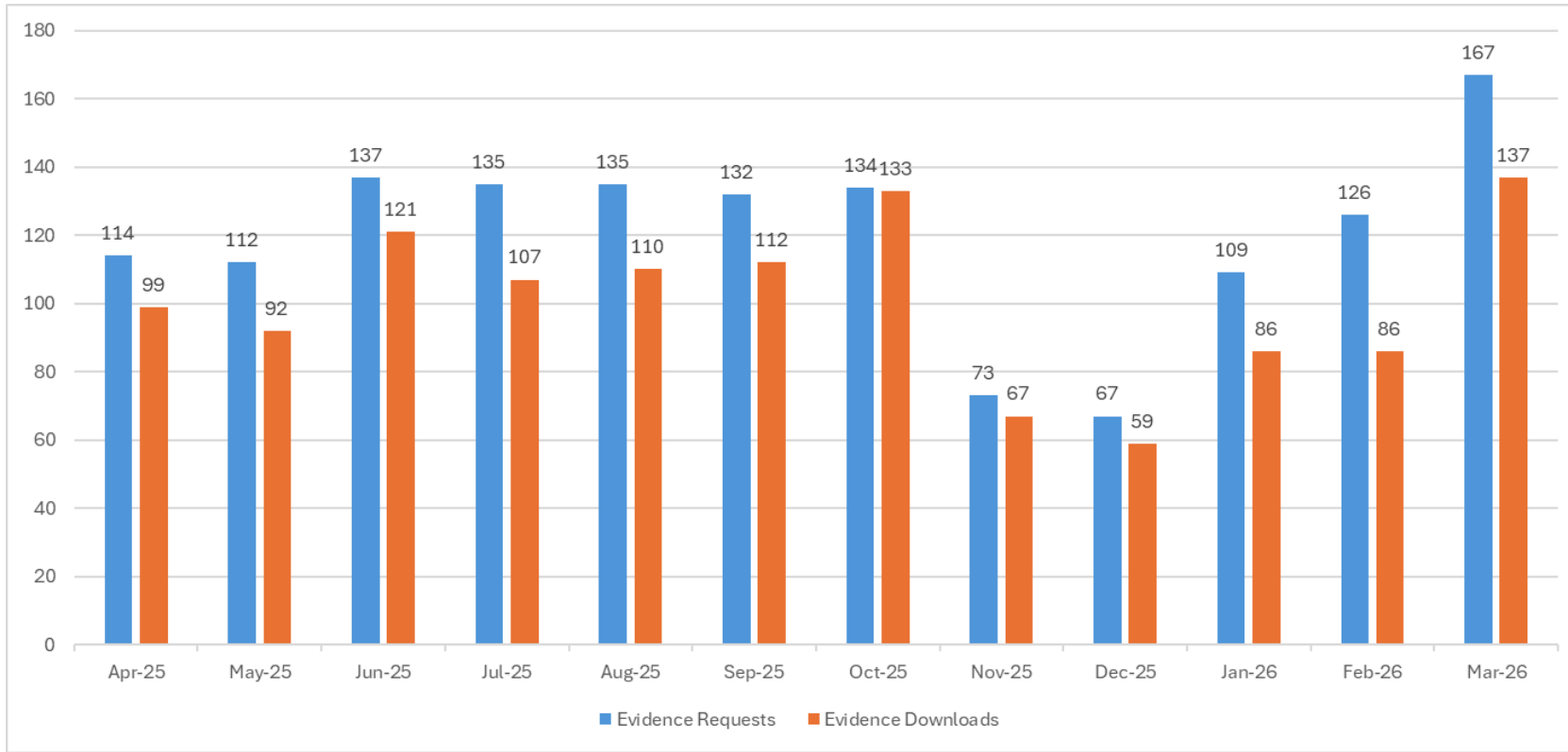

TOTAL CCTV EVIDENCE REQUEST & DOWNLOADS APRIL 2025 – MARCH 2026



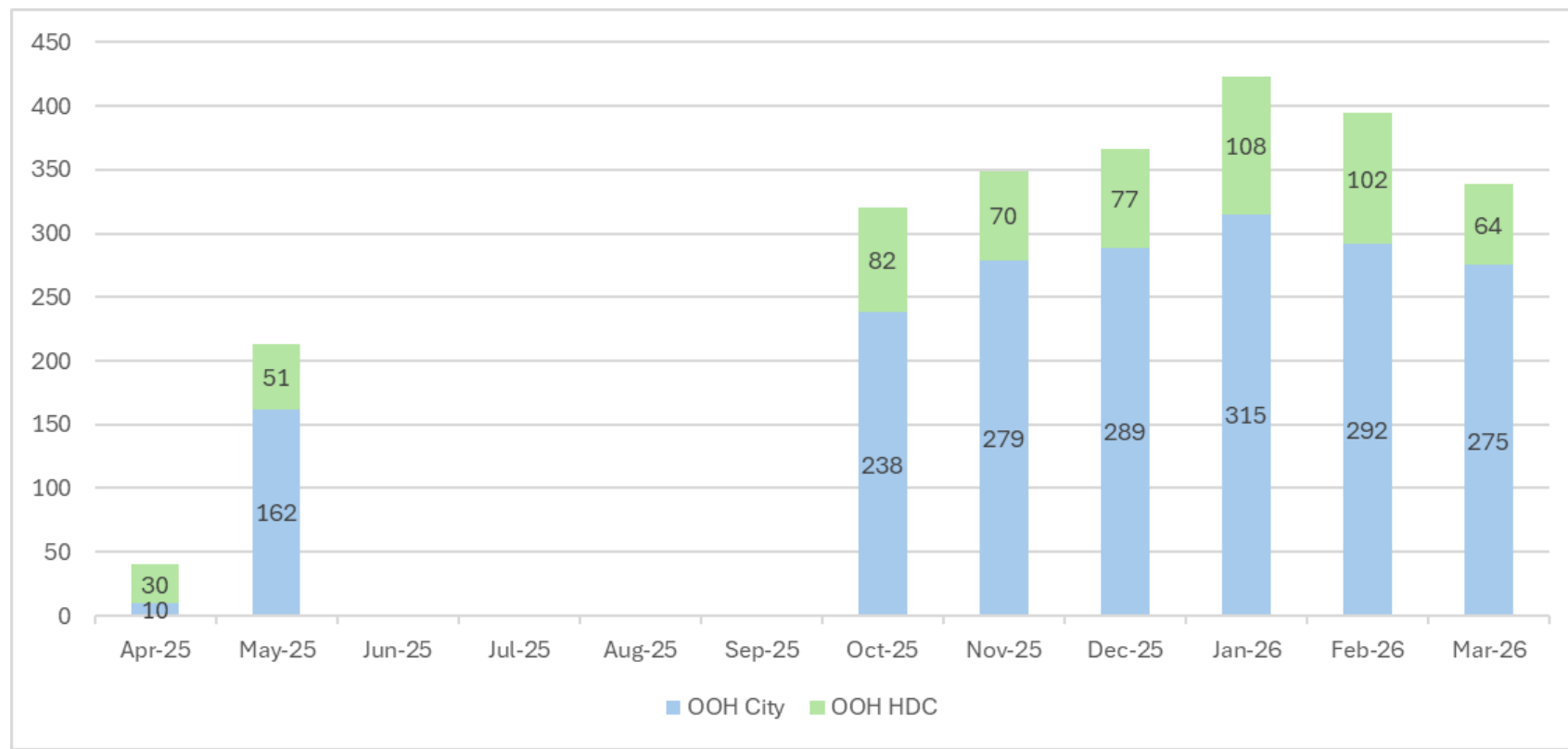
This chart shows the number of evidence requests and downloads since April 2025.

TOTAL OUT OF HOURS CALLS RECEIVED APRIL 2025 – MARCH 2026

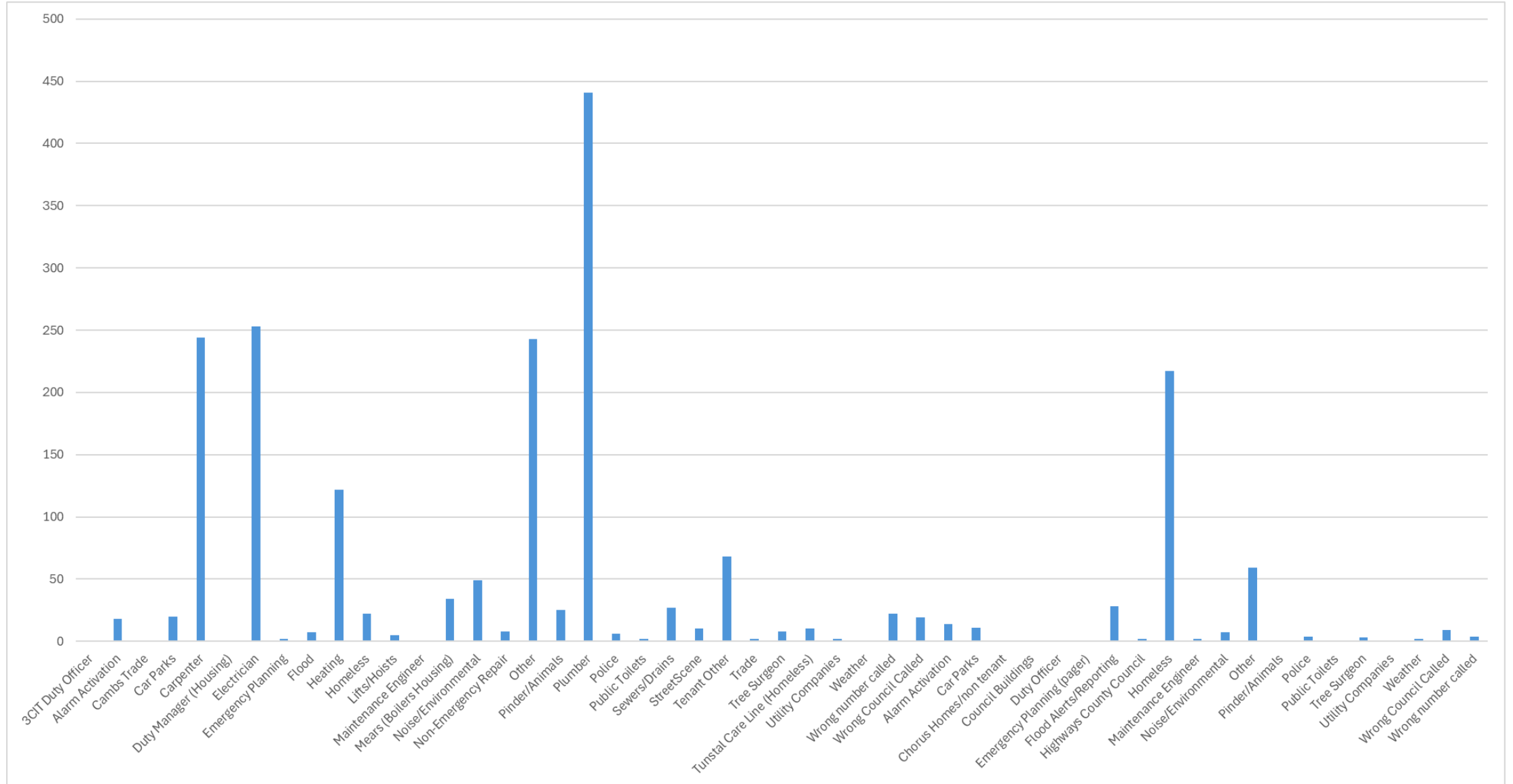


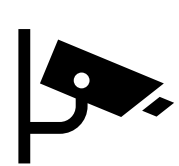

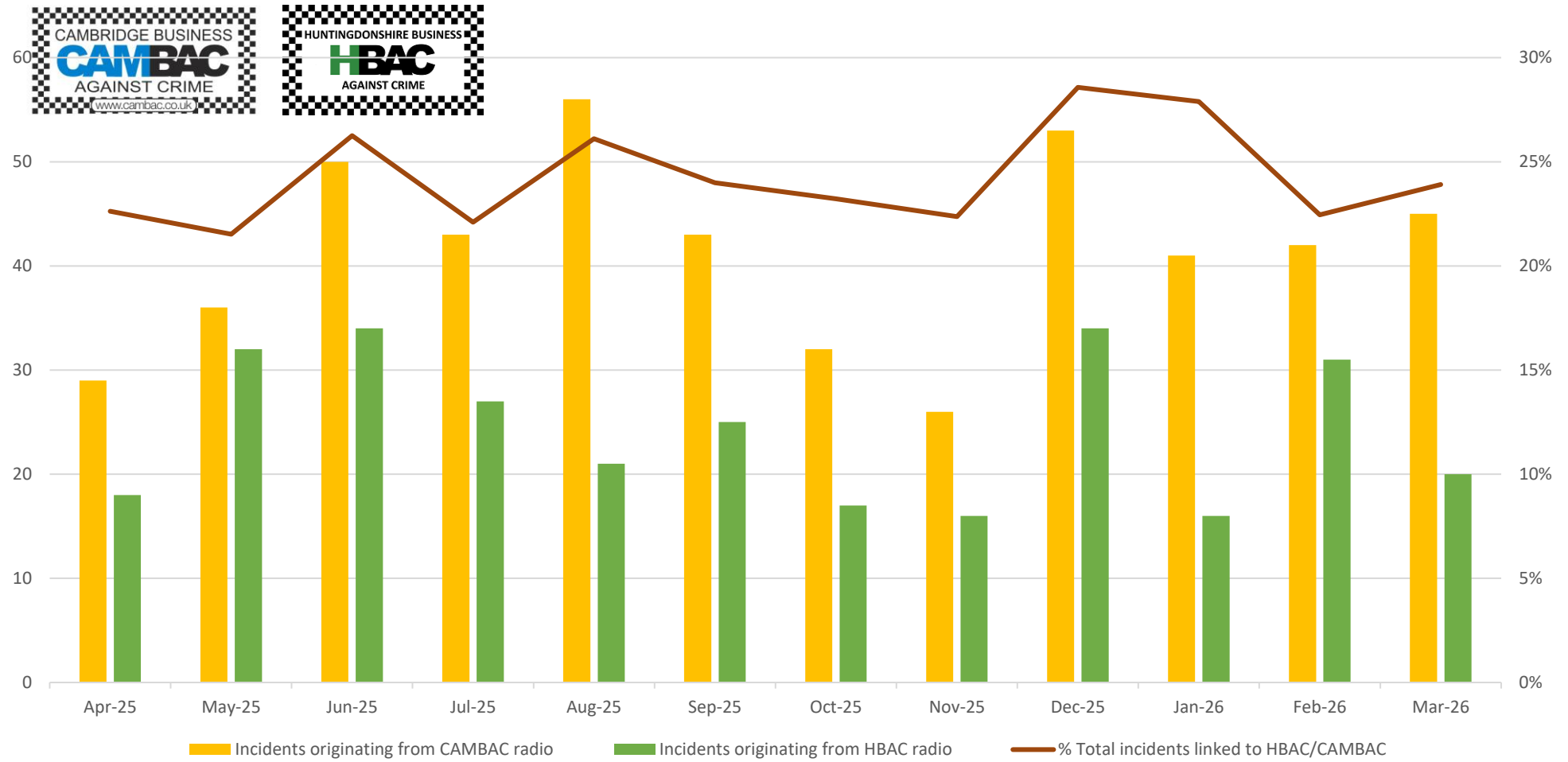

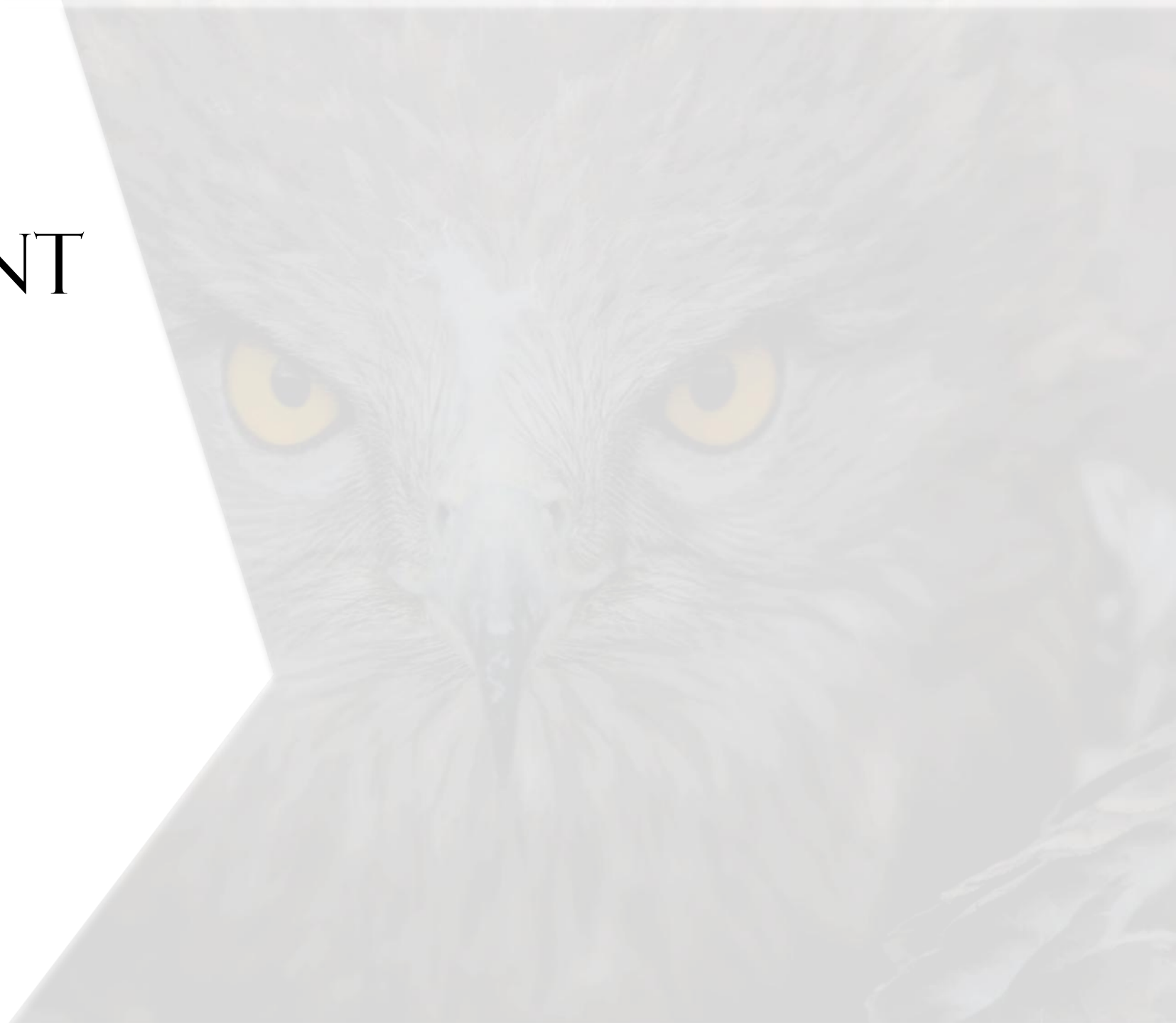
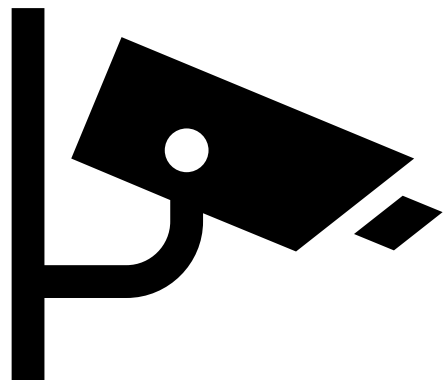
TOTAL CCTV INCIDENTS LINKED TO HBAC & CAMBAC APRIL 2025 – MARCH 2026

CCTV INCIDENT HIGHLIGHTS

- Our CCTV Operators regularly achieve fantastic results, we would like to share several highlights captured over the last quarter.
- The following incident write ups include a mx of crime and non-crime across both councils.
- We have experienced some excellent results; from pro-active arrests to tracking down some of our most vulnerable residents; saving lives and preventing crime from the control room.



Incident 38581 – 11th February 2026 - RS

TWO ARRESTED FOR THEFT OF MOTORBIKE

CCTV operators observed four IC1 males, all wearing black with black balaclavas with pedal cycles at the location. Sat on benches and watching people as they walk past. The group moves onto Market Square, one male gets off pedal cycle and approaches a motorbike. He appears to force the lock loose from the bike in an attempt to steal it.

Police made aware and officers deployed.

The male with the stolen motorbike pushes it down St Mary's Street, where a white BMW blocks the bike in. It turns out the driver of the BMW was the owner of the stolen motorbike. The four youths then leave the motorbike and get back onto pedal cycles.

CCTV operators kept observations, keeping police informed via radio where two males are intercepted and arrested.

Incident 38739 – 23rd February 2026 – MO

MISSING PERSONS

CCTV spotted three young males wondering around the High Street in Huntingdon at 03:29, with concerns they may be missing children.

Operators contacted police to enquire about any missing children that evening. Police checked and confirmed a group reported to be missing. CCTV gave detailed descriptions to be able to identify the individuals, the police confirmed they believe these match the images of the missing males.

CCTV kept observations and police attended where the males ran away, officers chased them and eventually stopped them. All three males were placed in a police van and returned home.

Police officers thanked CCTV for finding the males.



PRO-ACTIVE ARREST – DRINK DRIVING– HUNTINGDON



Incident 38146 – 11th January 2026 – JC, RS

ONE ARRESTED FOR DRINK DRIVING

CCTV operators observed a male urinating against a car at 02:41, then proceeded to stumble around to the driver's side and entered the car.

Police were informed and passed over the car's details, observations continued.

Officers pursued the vehicle and stopped the driver.

The driver blew 110 on the breathalyser and was arrested for drink driving.

RE-ACTIVE INCIDENT – INDECENT EXPOSURE – HUNTINGDON



Incident 38244 – 19th January 2026 – RS

ONE ARRESTED FOR INDECENT EXPOSURE

Reports of an IC1 male with black jacket and grey jeans who has exposed himself to a female on Priory Road. Police asked CCTV to be aware if he comes towards the town.

Cameras deployed and the male was located, police updated.

CCTV operators observe male heading towards Sainsbury's, the male was seen looking around potentially looking for another victim.

The male can be seen to expose himself and appears to be touching himself, police are made aware.

He appears to spot a female, who he watches and hides around a corner until he begins to walk in the same direction as the female.

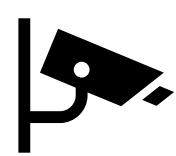
As he continues police arrive and intercept the male who is arrested.

Incident 32623 – 20th July 2025 – GB, RS

Criminal Damage Arrest

Operators spotted intoxicated male in St Neots High Street around 05:45, completely covering his face and taking an interest in passersby, prompting observation. The male later pulled a 6” knife and started to stab the tyre of a vehicle on Brook Street. Police were made aware and proceeded to send units to the area. The male caused further damage to another vehicles tyres before jumping over the church wall. Operators located the male on the RDC camera and police arrive and start a foot chase. Tracking the male on the cameras, operators were able to inform police where the male moved onto and was later located and found to have several knives on his person. The male was arrested for x3 criminal damage charges, possession of a bladed article and assault of an emergency worker (this was upon arrest).

The police went on to put out public communications on facebook to identify any other victims of damage to their vehicles.

Incident 36665 – 3rd DECEMBER 2025 – LM

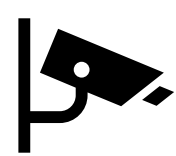
VIOLENT MALE ARRESETED

Request to look at location for a male arguing with a female and becoming violent. Male identified and cameras deployed to observe male.

CCTV operators observed male walking around town becoming increasingly angry and talking to himself, VB asked if operators were watching him and operators advised he is on their live feed.

The male then turned onto George Street and started to walk in the middle of the road hand ggesting at vehicles, police on route. Officers arrived at scene and took him to the floor, upon search they discovered a knife on his possession and was placed under arrest. A van arrived and the male was taken into custody. The market officer approached police officers and informed them the male was seen punching a food van earlier which caused damage. Playback also showed the make attempting to steal a scooter from the entrance of Superdrug, with the owner approaching him and pushing him away, he did not take the scooter.

Once all police officers had left, CCTV observations ended.

Incident 36553 – 10th November 2025 – LT

X6 ARRESTED FOR SHOPLIFTING

Report from Townrow with regards to a theft with location a descriptions of 6 individuals, believing the group have stolen items including a medium length carving knife.

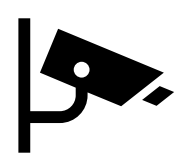
Cameras were deployed to the location described and located the group leaving the location after being aggressive with other members of the public. Operators followed the individuals on cameras and kept VB aware of locations and movements as the group split up. PSCOs stopped the car described by CCTV operators, officers stated the car smelt like cannabis, the male in the car ran from officers.

CCTV operators made police aware of the other individual's locations, resulting in police detaining two females and confirmed that had discarded stolen items in bushes.

One male was later detained by a dog unit, the male was placed in handcuffs by an ununiformed officer, searched but nothing found.

The car was also searched and further stolen items from other stores such as Superdrug, Peacocks and Boots were identified.

All six individuals were arrested and vans requested, male with officers outside of Greggs was taken in a car, all left, observations ended.


Incident 33940 – 12TH NOVEMBER 2025 – PM



TWO MALES ARRESTED FOR THEFT & POSSESSION OF WEAPON

Whilst monitoring airwaves, CCTV operators heard police trying to send a unit to an intruder alarm. Operators watched a playback of the location detailed to see if anything could be seen. Two males could be seen in a doorway before leaving and going off camera, further playback on 2207 gave a good description of clothing and details passed onto police. Operators continued to watch playback footage and tracked the two males, later spotting them with two females entering the grand arcade car park. Police informed and both males arrested by an ARV team with one male covered in broken glass and blood. It is believed that the males emptied the till and stole whiskey.

CCTV operators assisted with incident from first picking up on airwaves to arrest was approximately 30 minutes.

DRINK DRIVER ARRESTED

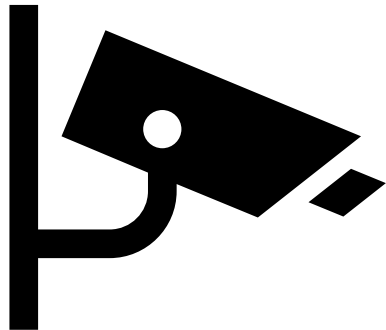
CCTV operators received a call from the Swan and Angel, informing that a male had left the pub after consuming 4 or 5 pints and they believe he was going to drive. Operators were aware this male has been banned from driving through close work with HBAC.

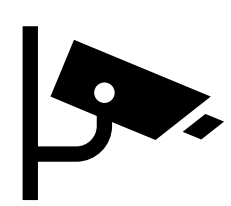
Operators alerted police and tracked the male to his car, location details provided to police as the male drove off. Various units responded and the male was stopped by officers and blew 85 on the breathalyser, resulting in an arrest for driving over the limit, driving with no insurance and driving whilst being banned.

Observations ended and police radioed thanks to CCTV operators for assistance.

He blew 147 on a roadside breath test, more than four times the legal limit and was arrested. 🚔

Unfortunately, this is something we encounter far too often. Drink-driving puts lives at risk, not just your own, but everyone around you.

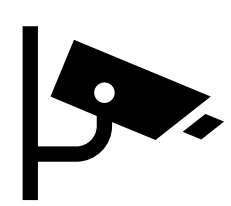

Cycle theft falls by 70% thanks to partnership work across Cambridge

25 March 2026

Cycle theft in Cambridge has fallen by 70% since 2019, thanks to partnership working to tackle cycle crime in the city.

A multi-agency task group, led by Cambridge City Council as part of the [Cambridge Community Safety Partnership](#), was set up in 2019 to address cycle crime in the city.

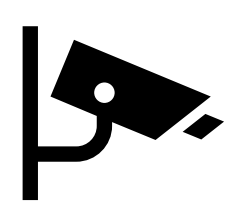
Partners have delivered a series of targeted measures to deter theft, protect bikes and support enforcement. These include:

- Extending and [upgrading the cycle parking area at Queen Anne Terrace](#), which is now access-controlled and is further supported by 12 CCTV cameras in the wider car park.
- Installing 16 CCTV cameras in the city centre, covering approximately 650 cycle parking spaces.
- Offering free bike marking throughout the city – with 1,750 bikes marked between 1 April and 31 December 2025 in Cambridge.
- Using enhanced enforcement measures, such as Criminal Behaviour Orders (CBOs) to deter and stop individual offenders.
- Encouraging responsible bike users to [love, list and lock](#) their bikes to help keep bikes as safe as possible.

The strengthened partnership approach has significantly reduced opportunities for cycle crime to be carried out while making it easier for residents to park their bikes with confidence.

Cllr Mike Todd-Jones, Cabinet Member for Safety, Wellbeing and Tackling Homelessness, said: “We are proud to continue working in partnership to tackle cycle crime. We have made real, sustained progress since 2019, and I am truly grateful to all the partners involved.

“Cycle crime has been a big concern for residents, and I am pleased our work is helping to address and ease those worries. No one should have to worry about being a victim of cycle crime. Cambridge is known for its cycling culture, which is good for the planet, good for personal health and part of what makes our city so special.

Men charged with kidnap stopped on A14 in Huntingdon

11th February

A group of men have been charged with kidnap after a man was taken into a vehicle "against his will". Cambridgeshire Police were called at around 10.28pm on January 20 with reports that a man had been taken into a vehicle against his will in Cambridge.

Just over half an hour later, officers stopped two vehicles on the A14 at its junction with Easton Road in Huntingdon.

Two men were arrested at the scene and another man was arrested the following day in connection with the incident.

A spokesperson for Cambridgeshire Police confirmed: "Luke Pepper, 53, of Oxenden Road, Great Oxenden, Market Harborough, was arrested and has now been charged with kidnap and intentional strangulation.

"Luke Pepper, 27, of the same address, has been charged with kidnap and assault occasioning actual bodily harm (ABH).

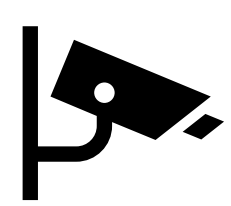
"Adam Hutcheson, 39, of the same address, has also been charged with kidnap." All three men are due to appear at Cambridge Crown Court to February 19 in relation to the case.

The police have also confirmed that this is an isolated incident and there is no wider risk to the public.

Chief Constable arrests shoplifters attempting to flee from St Ives

Chief Constable Simon Megicks joined the forces Rural Crime Action Team on Tuesday (9 March) for a hands-on experience tackling rural crime in Cambridgeshire.

Whilst on patrol, officers received a call from CCTV operators at about 1pm reporting a high-value shoplifting at Waitrose in St Ives.

They checked the cameras and spotted the suspects heading for the rural back roads.

Rural Crime Officers and the Chief Constable quickly stopped the vehicle as it attempted to leave St Ives.

Meat, alcohol and other stolen items were found in the boot of the car, valued at £1,141.35.

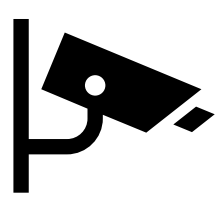
Three men aged 31, 43 and 57 years-old from Milton Keynes were arrested on suspicion of shoplifting, with one of the arrests made by the Chief Constable.

Two have been charged with two counts of shoplifting and fraud by false representation and a third man has since been given a conditional caution.

Rural Crime Action Team Sergeant Tom Nuttall said: "This was an excellent result which was the product of effective teamwork and determination, making it a truly memorable day for the Chief Constable.

"The swift response to the CCTV report and the coordinated efforts of our officers led to the arrest of three suspects and the recovery of a significant amount of stolen goods."

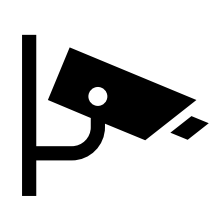

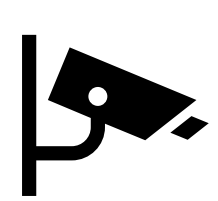

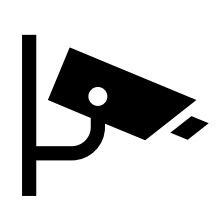


CCTV CAMERA MAP – CAMBRIDGE CITY AS OF OCT 2025

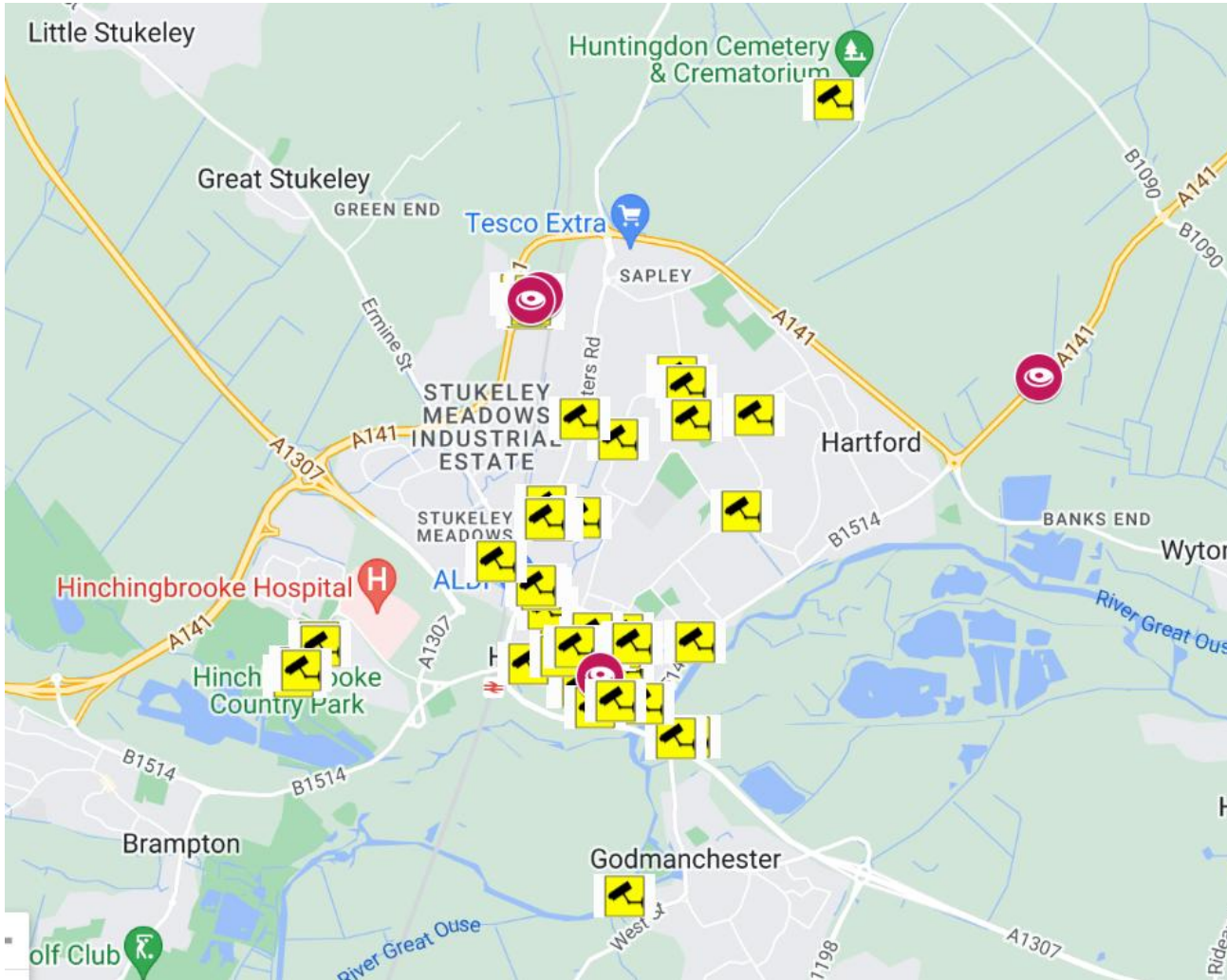

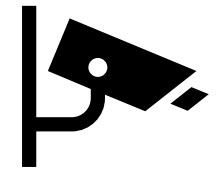


CCTV CAMERA MAP – HUNTINGDON & GODMANCHESTER AS OF MARCH 2025

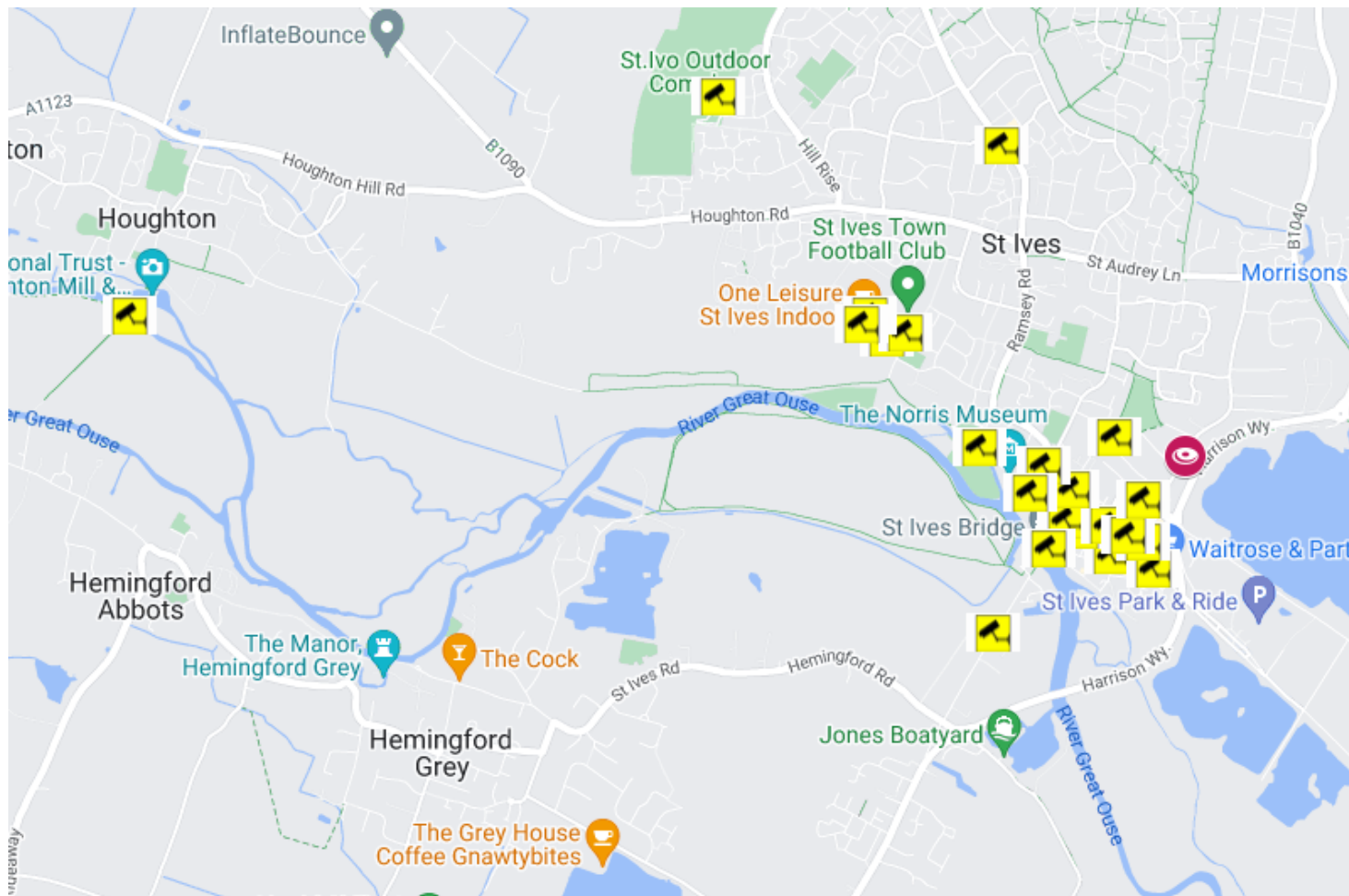

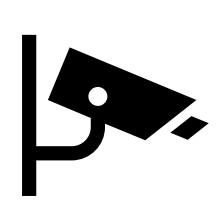


CCTV CAMERA MAP – ST IVES & HOUGHTON AS OF MARCH 2025

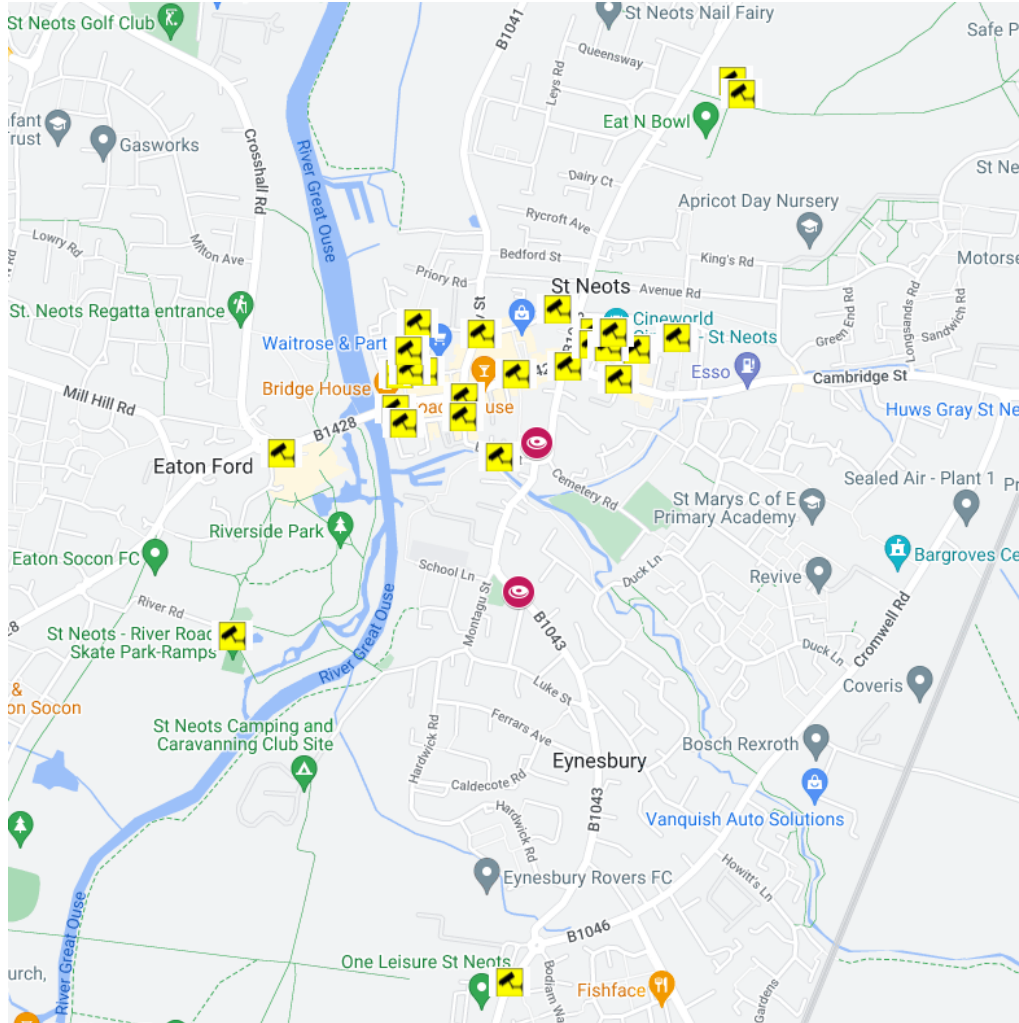

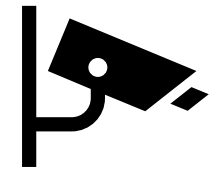


CCTV CAMERA MAP – ST NEOTS AS OF MARCH 2025

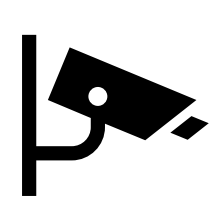


CCTV CAMERA MAP – RAMSEY AS OF MARCH 2025

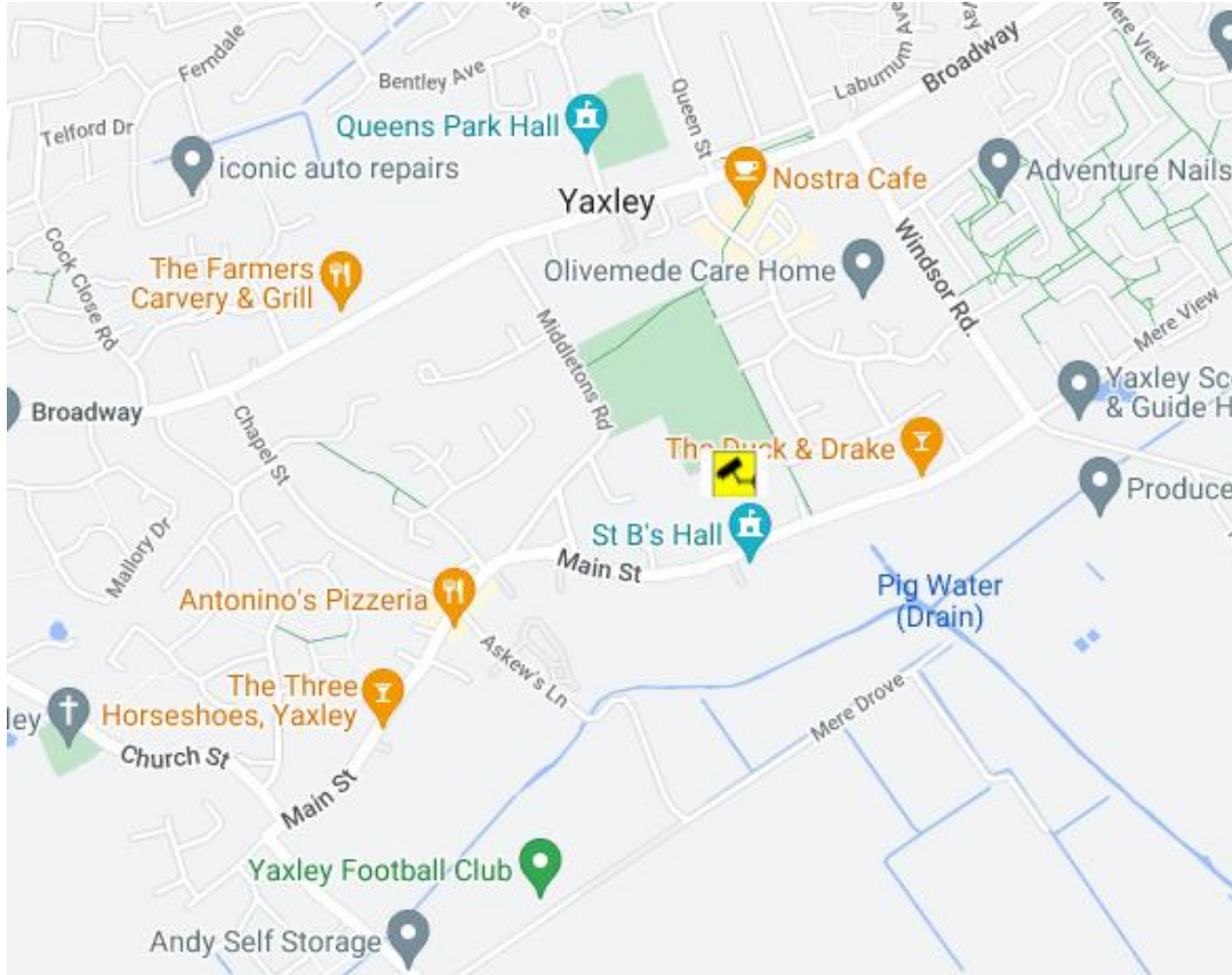

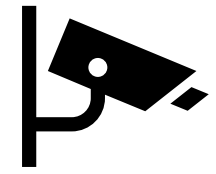


CCTV CAMERA MAP – YAXLEY AS OF MARCH 2025

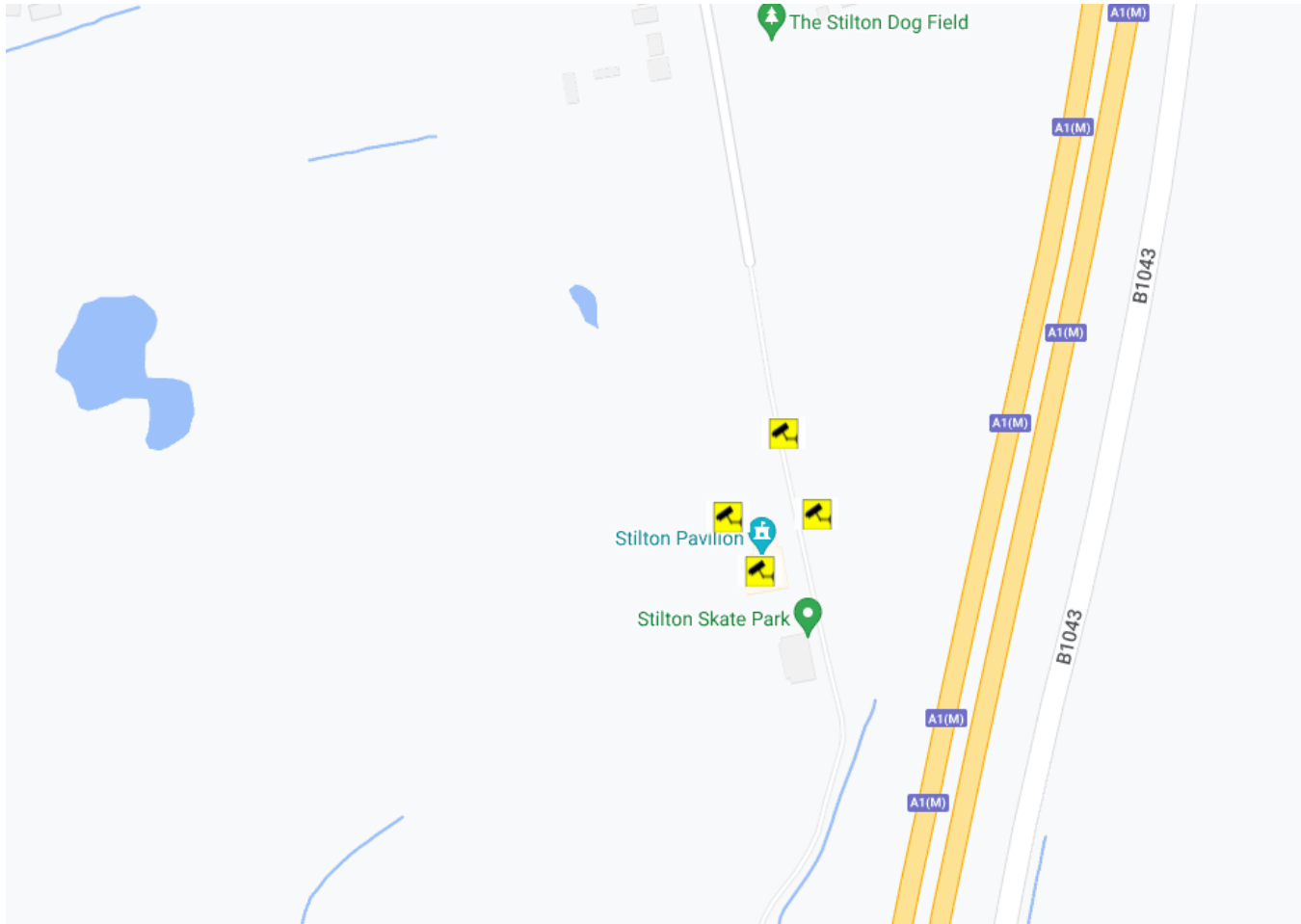


Yaxley Cameras – 1 camera

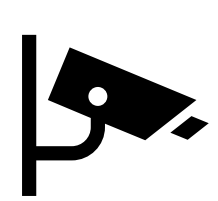


CCTV CAMERA MAP – STILTON AS OF MARCH 2025

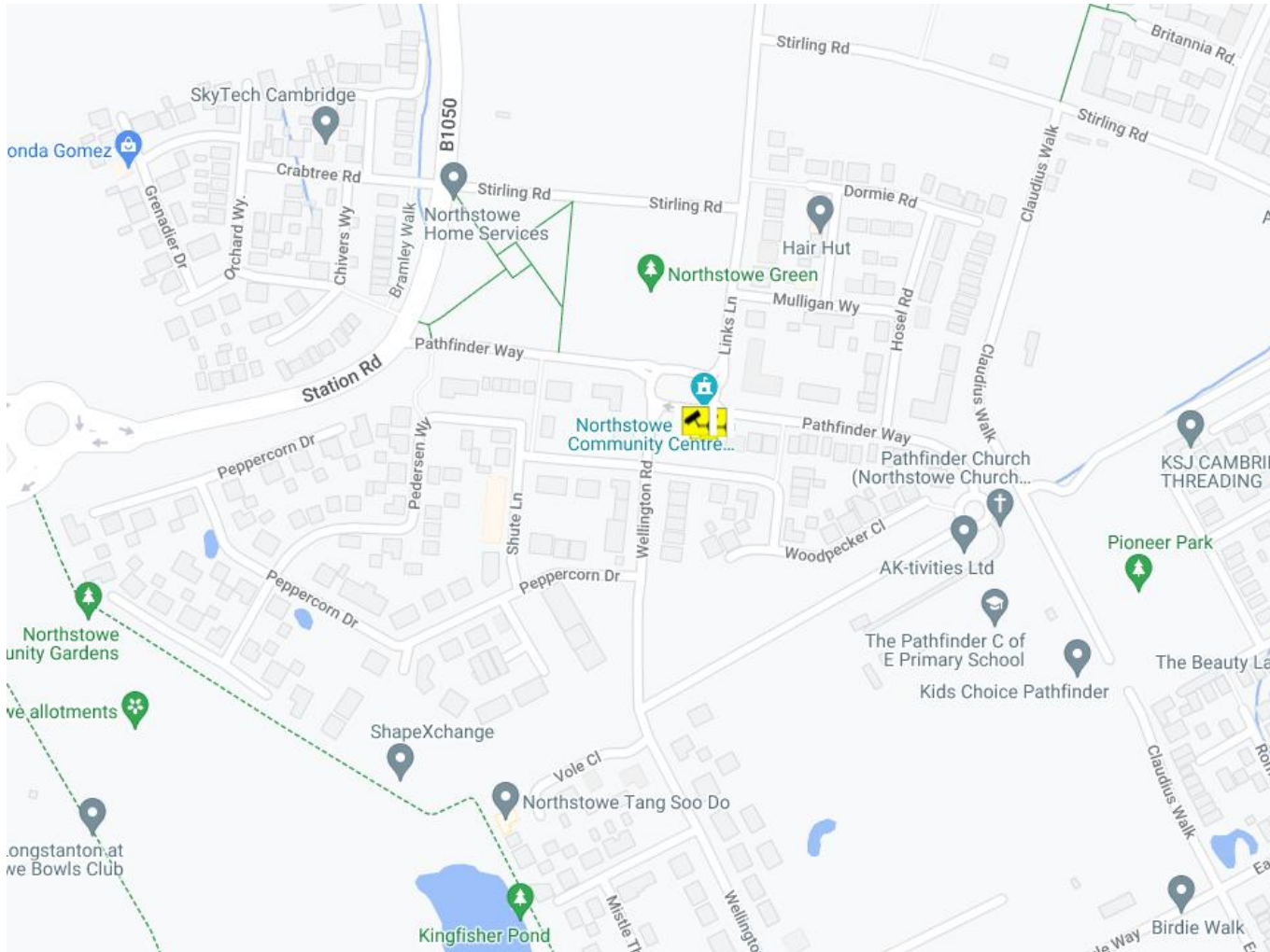
